Introduction to the Special Section: Perspectives on Reminiscence and Life Review

In March 2013, eleven leaders in the field of reminiscence and life review were asked if they would be willing to contribute an invited article for the inaugural issue of the journal. In spite of the relatively short time frame in which to complete their work, they all agreed. The authors were not asked to write about a specific topic or theme, but were told they could write about any subject they wished. The only guidance provided was that that the topic of their paper should be of special interest to them and one they thought could be of benefit to the field. As will be readily apparent to those familiar with the reminiscence and life review literature, every author in the Special Section has a record of significant contribution to the field – some from the vantage point of research, some through practice, and others from a combination of both. Not surprisingly, their engaging, thought-provoking, and position-shaping articles are exactly what we were hoping for in order to get the journal off to a strong start.

In addition to the consistently high quality of the contributions, it is interesting to note how different the topics are from each other.
